LANDOWNERS URGED TO HELP US GET WINTER-READY

Essex Highways crews have been out on the network through the spring and summer clearing gullies. Teams have also been grass cutting and weed spraying to prevent overgrown vegetation from blocking the highway and causing flooding.

But Essex Highways needs landowners to be diligent and maintain their own hedges and ditches. This helps keep highways across Essex usable and safe. In anticipation of wetter weather over the autumn and winter, the highways team is preparing for more calls and incidents relating to flooding. Many local floods are preventable if landowners keep on top of ditch and hedge maintenance.

Landowners are responsible for maintaining trees, hedges, shrubs and ditches on their land. This applies even if they are close or next to a road or pavement. They have a duty of care to take reasonable steps to prevent, or reduce as far as possible, the risk of injury or damage that could be caused to anyone else. Most trees and hedges by roads are on land owned by private landowners, including district councils,

city council, parish councils, housing associations and homeowners.

Examples of works that should be carried out by landowners include:

• cutting back overhanging branches, which reduce the width of or block the view of the road

 cutting back overhanging branches that reduce the height or clearance of the road for tall vehicles such as double decker school buses

 removing or trimming a damaged or diseased tree that is in danger of falling onto the road or pavement

 trimming overgrown hedges obscuring road signs or streetlights

 clearing any ditches located on private land to avoid any flooding during periods of heavy rain

Councillor Lee Scott, Essex County Council Cabinet Member for Highways Maintenance and Sustainable Transport, said: "Coming into the autumn months, it's important that preventative action is taken to ensure flooding is minimised across the county.

"Essex Highways crews have been busy throughout the summer clearing

gullies and maintaining our land in preparation, but we need this work to be complemented by landowners taking action too.

"I urge landowners – whether you're a homeowner, farmer or developer - to check ditches and hedges near roads and pavements and make sure they are properly maintained."



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Local Resident receives Royalty Award -Astrid Gillespie BEM

Astrid Gillespie has been awarded the honorary British Empire Medal (BEM) for services to community heritage after dealing with the aftermath of an illegal New Year's Eve rave in an isolated church building. The medal is awarded for meritorious civil or military service worthy of recognition by the Crown, and recipients are entitled to use the post-nominal letters 'BEM'. Congratulations Astrid!

Astrid has volunteered for around 13 years for the Churches Conservation Trust and looks after an unused Tudor church near where she lives – the All Saints Church of East Horndon which was built in the late 1400s (right).

Heading up the "Friends of All Saints, East Horndon" volunteering group, she opened the church to the wider community by putting on open days, concerts, theatrical productions and gardening days. Astrid also dealt with any vandalism and fundraising to cover the cost of repairs.



On New Year's Eve 2020 (in lockdown), the church was unfortunately used for an illegal rave and hundreds of people were removed by the police. It was left to Astrid and the church rector to deal with the aftermath. They quickly set up a fundraising page, did interviews for local radio and newspapers, and were even interviewed on Japanese TV about what had happened. With amazing support from the public, they raised over £22,000 in a few days to help cover the cleanup and repairs to the church, massively exceeding their £2,000 goal.

Since then, the clean-up and repairs have been carried out and more volunteers have come forward to look after the church. The churchyard is being tackled as it had become very overgrown, and more events are scheduled. There is even a security team on board including CCTV cameras, making the whole area feel safe and much more looked after.

The charity who own and maintain the church, the Churches Conservation Trust (CCT), nominated Astrid for an honorary British Empire Medal which was presented to her in October 2023 by HM Lord Lieutenant of Essex, Mrs. Jennifer Tolhurst.

Astrid was also invited to attend a garden party at Buckingham Palace during the summer.



Summer Flower Show

This year's annual summer Flower show took place in the grounds and hall of St Nicholas Church Ingrave on 19th August. This year marked its 142nd anniversary.

The marquees were erected, tables delivered, the beer had rested overnight, the committee and helpers were lining the tables, putting out signs, bunting, class labels and dividers and the sun was shining. There was no rain on the weather forecast. It appeared that we were in for a perfect summer's afternoon.

At 10am the villagers started to arrive with exhibits, all had left by the allotted time, the judges started to arrive as did the peripheral gusts of storm Betty. Only an average speed of 9 or 10 mph on the BBC website. They called it a "gentle breeze", but it was enough to cause havoc. The vegetables and fruit exhibits were housed in one marquee and the flowers in another. The other exhibits were in the hall and so safe.







The gentle breeze started to knock over the carefully arranged flowers in their vases, The polystyrene plates and bowls flew off the vegetable table complete with contents in some cases. The sides of the marquee acted like a sail, so we took them down, which stopped them blowing away but did not save many of the exhibits. Many of the identification cards blew away both before and after judging. We retrieved some from the long grass behind the now removed marquee, some we could not find. Those we had cards for we could allocate prizes to. Those with lost cards we attempted to identify the owner but some we could not. We laid the flowers down on their sides to stop any more damage but many off these then wilted. we tried to reunite blown away tomatoes to the correct owners.

2pm came and the villagers arrived, the band played, the tea, beer and Pimm's flowed, the craft stalls did good business, the country fayre was busy with folks buying books, plants, homemade cakes and crumbles, the raffles and tombolas were a success, the sun shone, the wind dropped, and a very pleasant afternoon was had by all. The afternoon was a great success!

From humble beginnings some 13 years ago, Animal Aid Festival now stands is in its ninth year and has grown to become a vibrant, music and fun filled event dedicated entirely to raising funds for animal rescue centres and animal related causes. This year we had an internationally acclaimed ELVIS tribute, The Brentwood BUSKERTEERS, Amy Winehouse Tribute, our very popular dog competitions, live bands, craft stalls, kids rides, ARIEL The Mermaid, and so much more.

The Animal Aid organising team includes volunteers young and old from all walks of life, all passionate about the well-being of our animals and all dedicated to making the festival a continuing success. Herongate and Ingrave Preservation Society (HIPS)

In this article we'll tell you about the history and work of HIPS.

Back in 1980's, and probably before then, a group of residents of Herongate and Ingrave decided that the history of our villages should be recorded, and the architectural environment protected and conserved. Trustees were gathered and HIPS was registered with the Charity Commission, residents were invited to pay an annual subscription, I think this was something like a £1 per residence a year. These funds covered printing costs and not much else. They'd already founded a museum based in what was once the Mission Hall in the yard in Heron Chase where Heron's Retreat now stands. HIPS founders included Major John Laurie as Treasurer, Jack Edwards as President, and Peter (Champion) Stevens as Vice – President.

Champion lived in Friars, formerly The Elms with his wife and their two friends Mr Lawson and his sister Miss Lawson. You can find out more of the history of The Elms, Elms Cottage and the two rooms attached to Elms Cottage that later became the museum building, in the 1984 document elsewhere in this newsletter.

As we understand it, the two rooms were built as an extension by the schoolteacher who lived in Elms Cottage, so that she could expand the number of children taught there. The Stevens donated the two rooms of Mission Hall to HIPS for use as a village museum.

Champion was a retired lawyer and company secretary and was fastidious in collecting and collating all things relating to the history here. In those days there weren't any computers, and the museum data was catalogued on hundreds of postcards stored in a bank of old green metal filing cabinets. In these was detailed every piece of information the team could muster, from the early history of our parish to contemporary information.

Champion was one of the prime movers lobbying for the M25 to be built, reducing the relentless, intrusive rumble of articulated lorries that used to pass along the A128. If you think traffic is bad now, imagine a similar volume of traffic we currently have at rush hour, continuing all day, with loads more huge articulated vehicles. Pretty much everything that now goes along the M25 was funnelled into the road links of the A127 and A128.

Champion mustered a team of us locals to sit by the roadside, clipboards in hand, tasked with the job of writing down the numberplates of every vehicle that passed by. We did this on a rota for days and weeks: an impressive community -led initiative. Champion then collated the information which identified where the vehicles were registered and he used this data to further the cause of the M25.

Over time, the museum curators gathered artifacts of all kinds: from what was catalogued as a 'man trap', and turned out to be a large animal trap, to fragments of masonry from some of the long-gone buildings of the parish. We still have boot mender, Jack Warner's bicycle, village butcher, Ernie Gray's meat cleaver and the commemorative trowel that was used when the first spit of ground was opened in the building of our stretch of the M25.



Years passed and HIPS continued to produce a village newsletter, notify residents of planning proposals and to fight to retain and protect the most important historical features here. Later, Herongate and Ingrave got a Parish Council who took on much of the work of keeping watch on potential developments and encroachments into Green Belt as well as the role of communicating by newsletter. When the 'old guard' HIPS trustees retired or died, new people stepped in to fill their place. For the past years a small group of us have held trusteeships; to be honest, we haven't been as dedicated, nor did we have as much time as our predecessors.

But as a registered charity, HIPS continued; we would open the museum for people who were interested, occasionally people would visit from Australia or the US. Sheila Murphy continues to bring some of our old maps and photographs to village events so that everyone can see them. The museum building began to decay and with regret we realised that we had to act. Insuring the building became impossibly expensive and we battled with the damp that began to cause decay, increasing damage to the artifacts and files. We were left with no choice but to sell the museum building and pass most of the documents on loan to Essex Records Office (ERO) in Chelmsford. We tried to catalogue everything, but the collection is vast and as the sale was hurried, we boxed up all the papers and took them to their new home.

Once the museum was sold, we had a collection of artifacts that needed to be stored somewhere safe and dry, a generous local person has housed these at no cost for us for the past few years.

In 2021 two of our trustees decided to stand down, leaving just two of us, Sheila and myself Jennie Penkul. We were fortunate to bring three new trustees into HIPS: Allan Murray and Linda and John White. Linda and John have dedicated many days to visiting ERO and going through the boxes of documents in our collection. They are collating this data and digitalising it so that in the future HIPS will be able to offer a comprehensive digital museum which will be linked to the PC website. In the past few weeks, we have welcomed two new trustees to HIPS, Tim and Rachel Coles, it's great to see HIPS has some young people on the team!

Over the past couple of years, we have made a few small grants to local projects, but it became apparent we were finding it hard to know how to best spend the money from the sale of the museum building. We wanted to find a very good use of these funds; the responsibility for this lies wholly with the trustees.

After a lot of thought and discussion the trustees decided to add a further clause to the HIPS objects (this is the list of aims of the charity that were registered with the Charity Commission when HIPS was set up). These are the existing objects of HIPS:

I)TO PROMOTE HIGH STANDARDS OF PLANNING AND ARCHITECTURE IN OR AFFECTING THE AREA OF BENEFIT;

II)TO EDUCATE THE PUBLIC IN THE GEOGRAPHY, HISTORY, NATURAL HISTORY AND ARCHITECTURE OF THE AREA OF BENEFIT;

III)TO SECURE THE PRESERVATION, PROTECTION, DEVELOPMENT AND IMPROVEMENT OF FEATURES OF HISTORIC OR PUBLIC INTEREST IN THE AREA OF BENEFIT.

Our planned addition will enable us to support the Physical and Psychological wellbeing of all our residents. We have now taken the first steps in registering changes to the HIPS objects. Interestingly we now find that the first trustees set up a constitution which gives trustees wide ranging scope to run the charity in ways that benefit the community. We are grateful that those first trustees made some carefully thought through decisions.

At the time of writing this, HIPS is involved in a new and exciting community project – see 'The Future of St Andrews Church'.

Securing Heritage and Community Legacy for Generations - Saving St Andrew's Church

As we approach 2024 we stand at a crossroads where we may lose both our community meeting places. St Andrews was built by the community, for the community, we believe it is irreplaceable and that it would be a tragedy if we don't do all we can to save this landmark site.

The Methodist community at St Andrews Church ceased worshiping earlier this year. Declining numbers of locals attending the church and the impact of Covid were the main factors affecting their decision.



A group of us got together to attempt to save the church, the community garden and the allotment from potential sale to the highest bidder. We had a fantastic response to a hurriedly called village meeting back in July, when around sixty residents attended and unanimously agreed that as a community, we would try to save the church. Since then, we have been working on this project and more than twenty residents came forward to offer practical help and support.

At a meeting with the Methodists Trustees in early September we presented a comprehensive business plan that would have enabled the church to continue. Unfortunately, we realised that our fears about the future of this important site were founded, the site will be sold and there is no deal to be done, such as a lease of the property for use of our community.

HIPS trustees have stepped up from our twice yearly meetings and mobilised the planning of the St Andrews project. We've been meeting frequently, quite a change from what we'd promised our new trustees! In the background, there have been and still are, multiple twists and turns in this journey, collectively we have put in hundreds of hours to this rescue mission.

In tandem with the situation with St Andrews, the matter of the future of Herongate Village Hall has recently resurfaced. This building has been derelict for many years despite being in the custodianship of Brentwood Borough Council. But that is a whole other saga.

Sheila Murphy, our Borough Councillor, has had the Church and its site registered with Brentwood Council as a Community Asset, this gives us a few short months to gather enough money to purchase the site. Fiona Marsh, our other Borough Counsellor is also offering a lot of support to the project. We are extremely grateful for the help of so many of our residents who have offered help and already given their time to the project. The list of names would be too long to put here, but each of you know who you are – Thank you.

Now that an opportunity to buy the church has arisen, it offers us all an amazing space for many kinds of activities. Here's the vision for St Andrews.

We have a workable business plan that includes activities for the benefit of all members of our community, from young to old.

- An outstanding daycare centre for village children.
- Space for 1st Ingrave Guides and the Beavers,
- a meeting place for the parish council and home for the village museum,
- a father's and toddlers Saturday group,
- Warm Rooms and Lunch Club for older residents,
- Community Choir, art workshops, Yoga and meditation sessions,
- the Emergency Shelter,
- the Community Defibrillator,
- Evening talks and discussion groups,
- · Business Networking,
- Ecumenical and community led faith services,
- a polyclinic,
- visits from Citizens Advice Bureau
- and a pop-up Post Office.

We will retain the War Memorial and the allotments. The community garden will continue and there are plans to create a nature trail. We will collaborate with the Billericay Foodbank offering horticultural classes and with the Wilderness Foundation who offer therapy in nature, who may use the garden for their outreach work. The building will be available for all residents to hire for celebrations including weddings.

This is just a flavour of the amazing opportunity the site and building offers our community,

We are about to start fundraising and taking the next steps toward saving the site in its entirety. This is complicated by the fact that we cannot know what a highest bidder will offer to purchase the site. Our fundraising plans include grant applications, government loans and gifts that would have a guaranteed return if we fail to complete the purchase.

Greg Campbell (Director of Policy & Delivery Brentwood Borough Council and Stuart Anderson (Facilities Manager Brentwood Borough Council) attended the parish council meeting on the 24th October 2023 to update residents on the situation with regards to the village hall and what the next steps might be.

Greg confirmed that Brentwood Borough Council have been made custodians of the village hall by the Charity Commission and as such will be the future decision maker with regards to the village hall.

The strict covenant concerning what can and cannot be done with the hall is still in place and Brentwood borough council will have to abide by the covenant.

Brentwood borough council were inviting the residents to have discussions about what they would like for the future of the hall. In reality the 2 possibilities are either to repair/rebuild the hall or to demolish it and grass the area over.

There was considerable discussion as to whether the Borough Council as custodian trustees since 1979 were in fact responsible for allowing the hall to fall into disrepair in the first place and Greg Campbell agreed to inquire about this with the council's legal department.

Greg Campbell agreed to come back and address the residents again once more information had been obtained.


